VILLAGE PEOPLE

It's been three years since we bid Chloe McClaughlin a fond farewell at Craven&ValleyLife HQ, and since then she's been on quite the career journey, conquering the world of soaps one storyline at a time. We certainly miss having her around the office, but we were delighted when she nipped in for a chat on Karen's Couch to share with us some of Emmerdale's most memorable episodes, including the unforgettably tense and wonderfully dramatic 50th Anniversary 'Storm Week' special back in October...



Chloe started on Emmerdale back in late 2019. Her work in prop stores concerned all those little details us viewers never really think about - from keeping track of where actors place down their props for continuity between takes, to adding fake Emmerdale-brands onto cans, bottles, cereal boxes and even magazines – it sadly looks like we won't be seeing any Craven and Valley Lifes gracing David's Shop shelves any time soon!

"At Emmerdale everyone has their own little jobs," Chloe explains, "and by early 2020 I was put on crew – weirdly enough I preferred standing outside in the rain for 12 hours, it was much more fun! Of course, after six weeks of training the pandemic hit, and we all got stood down."

Lockdown was an especially weird time for us all – I'm sure you don't need reminding – but even weirder for Chloe and the Emmerdale crew. In order to cover the transmission gap, Emmerdale ran six lockdown specials, the production of which Chloe was involved in. "There were only 18 of us in the building while we filmed the lockdown episodes," she recounts, "and it was proper strange! Once restrictions eased a bit later on, we were placed in cohorts of a few people – essentially a 'bubble' of all different people in all different departments forced together for 18 months.

"It's a bit of a cliché to say, but it is like a family. There's so much history with people being there for 20+ years that it might seem quite hard to join that environment, but, from my experience, everyone is so welcoming, so approachable, and just so lovely!"

It was during that strangely nostalgic early-COVID era that Chloe began to express her interest in wanting a job in editorial. A natural-born writer, Chloe was almost destined for storylining – and this destiny manifested itself in an incredibly admirable, palpable determination. Three official knockbacks, a virtual secondment, and an interview at Coronation Street eventually led to a job on the rather exclusive storyliner team, where she now works outlining the events and character developments of future Emmerdale episodes.

"I was of course happy with props, I loved

working directly with everyone, but all the cast and crew knew that storylining was what I really wanted to do. It was just so sweet when everyone found out I got the job; I must have been congratulated about 20 times walking from prop stores (where I'd found out I'd got it) to the canteen, I think that speaks to how fast news travels on set!"

The storylining process is as complex as it is interesting. In essence, it's a four-week cycle, beginning with a huge conference of writers, producers, and pitchers. It's then the job of storyliners like Chloe to bring the 'winning' ideas to life, plotting out key moments, locations and characters. A series of drafts and revisions follow, before the storyline can be complied into an overarching story for the writers to piece together. "It's a really fast process," Chloe explains, "and so luckily we don't write the actual scripts as well! That's one of the common misconceptions, I think, as we are basically giving the writers a summary: it's their job to write the actual dialogue that will make it into the script of the episode, not ours."

Chloe's first storyline was certainly a memorable one; it involved Nichola, victim of a brutal carpark assault a few episodes prior, discovering Naomi, daughter of Vicar Charles Anderson, was one of her attackers. While the episode aired in September 2022, it was written months prior. As Chloe recounts, "we storyline the episodes quite a few months in advance. The issue with that is that all my stories blur into one after a while! It's hard to pull yourself back to the present sometimes, I can never remember what plot threads people will or won't know yet!

"But pretty much straight after the Nichola/ Naomi story I went to working on the 50th Anniversary episodes." Emmerdale's unforgettable 'Storm Week' was a dramatic series of twists and turns (quite literally, due to the titular storm that ravaged the village). Chloe was the mastermind behind the gut-wrenching Amelia/Noah plotline that week – any grievances about tears shed can be directed towards her!

"That's why this job is so good, because you can get really powerful moments on your screen. Emmerdale, in my opinion, is best when it's

tackling an issue-based story that's tugging on your heartstrings, it adds the right balance of dark to the light."

Of course, we had to ask the Sophie's Choice questions – 'who's your favourite character?' "That's a tough one!" she laughs, "I do have a soft spot for Mary, Rhona's mum. I think she's hilarious, just so much fun to write! I like writing stories for the kids like Arthur and April, too. Now that they're coming of age, we can get into their personalities a bit which makes for a lot of interesting plot points. People like Charity are great too, mainly because you can just do anything with them!"

Chloe's biggest advice to people is to not give up. "You just have to keep at it. If you want something you have to fight, you have to keep going. In my case, there wasn't many jobs available, so I was never going to get it first time. Working in TV, it's not meant to be easy, it's almost out of your control in that regard. What you do have control of is being able to put yourself

out there, being productive, and not holding yourself back - that's all you really can do!"

From humble beginnings working at Craven and Valley Life's HQ, Chloe is testament to the fact that perseverance will always have its rewards. Her ability to bounce back and be resilient, even after repeated setbacks out of her control, has landed her one of TV's most important – and exciting – roles. Now that our Chloe is storylining, the future of Emmerdale is looking brighter than ever!

IN JUST OVER A DECADE, BRADFORD-BORN LANDSCAPE ARTIST **DANNY ABRAHAMS** HAS BECOME ONE OF YORKSHIRE'S FINEST PAINTERS.

anny had never touched a paintbrush before the age of 32. Yet, in the space of a decade he has become one of Yorkshire's most beloved painters with his nostalgia-inspired pieces. Sweeping the viewer off their feet and setting them down in familiar northern settings that are twisted in wonder, the Bradfordborn artist has captured the world of childlike innocence filled with fun, adventure and playing out until tea-time. "It was just something I thought I'd have a go at. Now I feel so blessed to be in galleries, especially when you think of how many people went to art school and dream of this all their life," said Danny.



His paintings take inspiration from the beauty of northern landscapes, often depicting scenes of nostalgia, naivety, exploration, community and industrialism. Danny finds beauty in everyday images and things we take for granted, whether that be the sentimental feeling of childhood wonder we all, deep down, yearn for, or the natural beauty of tall trees, open fields and, prominently featuring in all of his pieces, the cloud-filled Yorkshire sky.

Before he found the world of art, Danny worked with lighting, starting out sign fixing with his dad immediately after leaving school and then working with neon lights soon after. It was during this time that he discovered his passion for painting, something he thanks his wife for. "She does like to rub it in my face a bit that if she hadn't bought me those paints I wouldn't be painting", he laughs. "As you get older, you realise how precious your time is, and so it's alright being in a job for the rest of your life but if you're not enjoying it then what's the point?"

Unfortunately, at the same time as finding his love for painting, Danny unexpectedly lost his sister, Gemma, when she was just 30. "That was just as I was getting to the stage where I was deciding whether it was worth the plunge to leave my job. Losing my sister so suddenly changed my outlook on life altogether - it was like I either go for it now or I never go for it because life's too


short and you never know what's round corner."

Since then, Danny has been able to devote himself to his art, rising from someone new to the medium completely to someone selling pieces rising in value - a journey that should not be understated as he is completely self-taught. "I remember needing some sort of guidance when I first began, so I started looking on YouTube and buying books about different techniques. I kept trying to cram myself with information and I realised it was blocking my natural flow of being an artist and being creative. I got rid of all that and decided to follow my own path. I suppose that's what caused me to have my own style.

"The first ever painting I did was just a little barn in a little field from one of those art books I bought. I started out using acrylics at first, but quickly realised I couldn't get those big, sweeping skies with them. Danielle couldn't believe I had done it myself. I tried oil paint after that, I didn't even know what it was when I started using it, but I've come to realise that's what I prefer – oil on board. That medium allows me to paint these big skies, and so I've stuck with it."

Said skies are one of the most prominent, and powerful, subjects in Danny's work. He describes them as an "everyday natural wonder that most of us take for granted. The sky has a beauty and rawness that never ceases to amaze me."

Success as an artist has allowed Danny and his family to open a gallery that could host a large collection of his paintings. Abrahams Gallery opened in 2020 on Haworth's Main Street. "It is



my sister Victoria's gallery. She always wanted to open a shop on the main street, so we just decided let's go for it. It just felt right having a gallery in Haworth, it felt like the sort of place I could paint my Yorkshire scenes and fit in. It's unbelievable how many people come to visit it on weekends!" The gallery is open from 11:30am-4pm from Thursday to Sunday.

Being located in Howarth has allowed Danny to be further inspired by the natural beauty of Yorkshire landscapes. "There's so much nostalgia that you can't go wrong with painting around that area; you have Haworth, Stanbury, Oakworth valley railway – all these places that seem lost in time."

Danny's continued hard work and devotion to his art has evidently paid off, gaining national recognition for his work, with it being exhibited and sold all over the country. On the 12th November, Danny has an upcoming winter exhibition at the Acorn Gallery in Pocklington, and just in time for Christmas, there will be another exhibition on the 11th December at Abraham's Gallery in Haworth. Not only is his work, with their stunning skyscapes and varied colour palettes, just a joy to look at, but he's managed to capture a sense of deep nostalgia that all us northern folk can relate to in one way or another. But more than anything, Danny is testament that it is never too late in life to find your passion, nor is it too late to discover new talents, to experiment, to learn, to fail, to succeed and find your true self. @

finely chopped

2g crushed pink peppercorns

2g toasted sesame seeds

3tbsp toasted hazelnuts, chopped

To make your crispy coating, spread the chopped green herbs, pink peppercorns, sesame seeds and hazelnuts in a thin layer on separate plates. Then, line a baking tray with greaseproof paper.

Divide the goat's cheese into 24 equal portions. Using your hands, roll each portion gently into a small ball.

Roll your goat's cheese truffles in your coating mixtures, alternating between the herbs, peppercorns, sesame seeds and hazelnuts to get an even spread of flavours, until all truffles are evenly coated. Place on your lined baking tray and refrigerate for at least 30 minutes.

40ml lemon juice

25ml honey

Few drops angostura or orange bitters

1 free range egg white

Ice to shake

Twist of grapefruit zest to garnish

Place two martini glasses in the freezer to chill, preferably an hour in advance.

Fill a cocktail shaker (or flask) with ice and add all the ingredients. Shake vigorously for 1-2 minutes or until the shaker feels icy cold and the mixture is frothy.

Strain into your chilled glasses and garnish with a twist of grapefruit zest. Serve immediately and enjoy!

Fruity Gingerbread Wreath

Create a sensational, colourful Christmas centrepiece with this delicious edible wreath

Makes about 25 biscuits

Ingredients

50g unsalted butter, diced
50g Demerara sugar
100g golden syrup
1 tsp mixed spice
1 tsp finely grated fresh ginger
1 tsp bicarbonate of soda
30ml beaten egg
250g plain flour
About 20 tbsp Bonne Maman conserve in many flavours and colours
250g white fondant icing
250g Royal icing sugar

To make the gingerbread dough, put the butter in a large bowl.

In a saucepan, stir together the sugar, syrup, spices and ginger and bring to the boil. Add the bicarbonate of soda (it will puff up) and pour the hot mixture over the butter. Stir until the butter has melted.

Beat in the egg and slowly blend in the flour. It will look as though there is too much flour but it will blend in.

Knead the dough in the bowl until smooth and cut into quarters. Wrap each piece in clingfilm. Roll out a quarter of the dough at a time to make the biscuits.

Roll the dough out between two sheets of baking parchment, to about 3mm thickness. Use a variety of Christmas cutters to stamp out about 50 biscuits of varying sizes. We used snowflake cutters from 12cm across down to 4cm. Remember you will need two of each size, to sandwich together. Reknead and re-roll the trimmings. Lay the biscuits out on baking sheets, lined

Lay the biscuits out on baking sheets, lined with baking parchment. Stamp out the centre from half the biscuits to create the space for the conserve. We used a 2½cm and a 1½cm round cutter. Chill the biscuits for a good hour before baking.

Heat the oven to 170C, 150C fan, gas 3. Bake the biscuits in batches until golden and crisp. They will take between 7 and 10 mins, depending on size. Cool on a wire rack.

While the biscuits are cooling, roll out the fondant icing on a surface dusted lightly with icing sugar and stamp out 6 or 7 snowflakes, using the same cutters. Stamp out the centres, using the same round cutters. Brush the top biscuits with a little conserve and lightly press on the matching icing.

Brush all the base biscuits lightly with conserve and press on the top biscuits. You should now have about 25 snowflake biscuit sandwiches of various sizes, some iced with fondant and some plain.

Put the Royal icing sugar in a bowl with 40ml of cold water. Gradually beat the icing until it forms a stiff but pipeable paste. Spoon into a piping bag with a small nozzle and pipe or drizzle icing across most of the biscuits to resemble snowflakes. Leave the icing to set for 10 minutes. Fill the biscuit centres with various flavours and colours of Bonne Maman conserve. Store the biscuits in airtight containers until ready to use. To serve, arrange the biscuits in a generous wreath on a large white board and take to the table for Christmas tea.



Cook's tips

If you don't have cutters, draw simple snowflake outlines on stiff card and cut out. These templates can be used to cut out the biscuit and icing shapes.

reate a gorgeous, textural Christmas hallway by decorating with rustic ornaments, from brushed steel candle holders and lanterns to wooden Christmas decorations and boxes. Wicker boxes and baskets provide handy hallway storage and somewhere to put gifts for guests. Hang Christmas tree decks on branches of pussy willow in a vase on a hallway side table to make things feel festive without overwhelming what's often a narrow space.

Greenery - real or faux - is an excellent example of something which can be used in excess without overwhelming the space. Wrap garlands along the top and bottom of your bannister, adorn mirrors and picture frames and include a mini Christmas tree.



Craft your Own Scandi Christmas

Christmas is the perfect time for crafting, here's a couple of our seasonal favourites that will help you to create, not just crafts, but also memories...





UPCYCLED SOCK NISSER (GNOMES)

These festive gnomes are so quick to make and don't even require any sewing, just a hot glue and scissors. We always seem to have an excess of single socks every time I do any laundry, so it is a great way of recycling them.

When cutting the faux fur, the trick is to cut only the backing fabric and not the actual fibres themselves, otherwise you will end up with an uneven finish. The easiest way to do this using scissors is by marking out the shape you require on the backing (ensuring the fur is pointing down) and then making lots of small snips, brushing the nap away from the cut edge as you work. However, it is much quicker to use a sharp craft knife if you have one, then you can regulate the depth of the cut and ensure you don't hack into the beard fluff itself.

- 1 Fill one of the socks with rice to make the base of the gnome. The quickest method for this without making a dreadful mess is by filling a pint glass with rice, putting the sock over the rim and then inverting the glass. Repeat with the second pint of
- 2 Mould the sock between your hands until you have an even, cone-shaped base then fix the elastic band around the top.







MATERIALS

- 2 socks, ideally in different colours
- · 1kg of rice
- · Hot glue gun
- · Elastic band
- Wooden beads (12mm in this case)
- · White faux fur



- 3 Snip off the excess sock fabric and then apply a ring of hot glue around the elastic band, pushing the trimmed material into the adhesive to secure it.
- 4 Snip your faux fabric into a beard shape, cutting out a small V-shape from the top edge. Apply a line of glue to the top at the back and then fix on to the base, about halfway up.
- 5 Take your second sock and pull it down over the base so the hem is covering the top of the beard, folding it up into a nice brim. Make sure the heel is pointing towards the back of the gnome.
- 6 Add a dab of hot glue to one of the holes on the wooden bead and then push it into the V-shaped cut to make a nose.
- 7 Blob a little more on the second bead hole and bring the hat down to cover it.
- 8 Working round the brim of the hat, add more adhesive and secure it to the body.
- 9 Tie a section of ribbon or baker's twine around the top of the hat, then snip off any excess.
- 10 To make a girl gnome, the process is the same, except for the lack of beard. Cut three thin strips of fur fabric or chunky wool, and plait them together to make a braid, tying off one end with baker's twine in a bow. Repeat to make a second braid.
- Glue the braids underneath the hat brim before fixing on the nose.



WALNUTPIXIES

These dear little walnut babies are so quick to make in batches; in fact the hardest part is cracking the shells neatly. Pre-prepared walnut shells are available to purchase specifically for crafts, but the problem with that is that you don't get to eat the nut itself. The easiest way to split them in half neatly takes a little preparation but should guarantee a higher success rate than if you just attack them with a nutcracker(older walnuts will split more easily than fresh ones). Soak the nuts overnight in a bowl of boiling water. Rinse them and dry thoroughly. Take a sharp knife and carefully push it into the split at the rounded end of the nut, then gently wiggle towards one side along the crease. Remove the knife, turn the nut round and once again wiggle down the split. Now place the knife horizontally along the split and gently push down on the knife, applying firm pressure. The walnut should open into two equal halves; it probably won't work every time, but certainly gives you a higher success rate than any other method. (The leftover walnut pieces are delicious plunged into a jar of golden runny honey, steeped for a few days and then spooned over creamy natural yoghurt for breakfast). Once you have cracked the trick of splitting the walnuts open, there are so many speedy ways of making dinky decorations.










MATERIALS

- · Walnut shells
- · Cotton wool balls
- · 25mm jacquard ribbon
- · Knitted glove
- · Baker's twine or paper ribbon
- Needle and thread
- · Hot glue gun
- · Fine marker pens

- 1 Cut a 4-5cm section of ribbon; if it has a pattern make sure it is centred where you would like. Thread the needle with a double length of cotton and then sew a line of tiny running stitches along the bottom of the ribbon.
- 2 Draw the thread up gently so the ribbon makes a 'cup' shape; don't pull it all the way as then you won't get such a rounded bed shape.
- 3 Glue half a ball of cotton wool into the base of the shell to fill it, then add another little blob of adhesive to its pointy end and attach the two ends of the twine to make a hanging loop.
- 4 Take the ruched ribbon and glue half a cotton wool ball to the reverse side to puff it out, then add more adhesive and secure it to the lower half of the walnut shell.
- 5 To make the head and hat, firstly draw a tiny face on the wooden bead, ensuring the holes are pointing vertically. I always think it is best to draw the features on at this stage then if it ends up with a face like a baby gargoyle you can always spin it round and have another go at it.
- 6 Snip a 4cm section of finger from the glove and roll the cut edge over twice to create a little knitted hat. Insert the glue gun and add a couple of blobs of adhesive to secure the brim, and then squirt a generous amount up inside the hat. While the glue is still warm and pliable, pinch the front and back of the hat together. Blob a little more glue on the left-hand side of the hat at the top, then fold it over and attach it to the brim.
- 7 Insert the bead just under the brim, adding a blob more adhesive if necessary, and hold it in place until it sets.
- 8 Glue the whole hat/head combo into the walnut shell, nestling it snugly under the blanket.





This month is the perfect time to teach your children about mindfulness, as you spend time together over the Christmas period.


Mindfulness can be a strategy to help manage emotions and keep everyone calm, while also giving families an opportunity to bond together. While the focus of this

One of the best gifts we can give our children is having a grateful heart. Studies show that gratitude for children can be a powerful tool in developing empathy, resilience, self esteem and improves their ability to cope with stress.

Below is a short meditation that you can do with your children at any point over the festive period. A lovely time to do anything like this is when you have tucked them up in bed at night.



ver the years, 85-year-old Maurice Baren from Haworth has garnered deserved attention for shaving his hair for charity. He's undeniably admirable, both in the money

he has raised and in the way he's not afraid to look daft so long -as it's for a good cause. What might seem a simple act has had incredible, farreaching effects –with Maurice having raised over £80,000 for Action for Children and End Polio Now since his first shave back in 1989.

"I don't think I was self-conscious the first time I had my whole head shaved; I think I just felt it was going to be some good fun. And that's the way I've viewed it all the way through!"

Maurice recounts that as more and more people have gotten involved over the years, his shaves have become more and more extreme, "but it's

> all still in good fun as far as I'm concerned. I'm quite prepared to be daft if it helps raise money!

"Tve had a beard since about 1980," he explains. "My wife Judith and I had been involved with Action for Children for many yearsand have previously acted as District Organisers for the fundraising. The

organisation had an event commemorating the centenary of the death of Thomas Bowman Stephenson (the founder of the charity) and, in order to raise money, I was convinced to have my beard and moustache shaved off. I thought it would just be a one offat the time!"

But the decision to make a tradition of the shavecame sooner than Maurice had expected. "I remember there being alocal charityevent that managed to get Bonnie Langford involved, and I was reminded how I'd previously agreed to have my head totally shaved. On that occasion we raised about £1.000!"

Maurice was also keen to explain his love of horticulture, something he has continuously devoted himself to over the years. His work with Britain in Bloomhas led to some amazing opportunities to judge across the UK and Europe, but the most exciting moment came 10 years ago, when he was asked to be flown out to Montreal asa judge for Canada's Communities in Bloom-"I'd certainly have been daft to turn that opportunity down!"

The event in advertently had a huge impact on Maurice's charity work. A bust with grass for hair inspired the ingenious idea to dye Maurice's hair before being shaven. Bright colours have been a staple of his shaves ever since, with Maurice most recently sporting a brilliantly bold pink and green for the last shave in October 2022. "I more or less left the colour of my hair to my hairdressers," he laughs, "it really was great fun -plus I couldn't object once they were halfway through! Everyone in the salon had a hoot of a time seeing me get all dolled up!" His nails also get done for the occasion. What started out as a purple fingernail (to commemorate the purple fingernail that marks if a child has been vaccinated against Polio in many South Asian villages) swiftly evolved into a bright set of all different colours.

Once again, Maurice gives his manicurist free reign to decorate him in whatever way they want, "I probably wouldn't have it as an everyday look, but if they want to have some fun with me,I'm more than happy for it to be done!

"I don't mind what they do, just as long as it encourages people to give! And ultimately, it's not about the shave, it's about what good we can do with the money we have raised. "Through letters alone we have raised over £11,000," Maurice explains, "and then the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation in the USA put £2 to every pound we raised for polio –it's incredible."

In total, for both Action for Children and End Polio Now, Maurice's most recent shave raised a staggering £26,000 –an incredible number, but one which pales in comparison to the astounding £80,000 Maurice's shaves have accumulated over



the years. Good can -and will -be done with the money that comes from these shaves.

Just from the most recent event, over 6,000 children in places like Pakistan and Afghanistan will be able to receive a Polio Vaccine. Where 50 years ago, children were left incapacitated, restricted to iron lungs, malformed, and very often fatally ill, now, thanks to the charitable workof people like Maurice helping to raise funds for vaccines and other forms of protection, children are far less vulnerable, and far more likely to receive the aid they need and deserve.

Maurice also holds hope for the future. "I had said that this recentshave would be my last, but who knows! If I get to 90, and am in a fit state, I don't see how I could say no to doing it again! Knowing that so much good can be done, I'm quite prepared to go through the hair dying, nail painting, shaving and daftness again –it's just a case of if I am physically able to do so."

Maurice is testament to the idea that a seemingly small charitable act can have far-reaching positive effects. What might be seen as asimple shave leaves thousands far less vulnerable than theymight have otherwise been, and the importance of that cannot be overstated. Whilst his shaves may only be every fiveyears, Maurice is eager to emphasise that donations can still be made through contacting the Keighley Rotary Club. Every penny is a valuable tool to support the fight against diseases like Polio.


9. SEND OUT CHRISTMAS CARDS
