REAL ANIMALS, REAL ART

Craven&ValleyLife TALKS TO MEGAN ELIZABETH ABOUT HER LOVE OF DRAWING PEOPLE'S PETS AND OTHER ANIMALS

olmfirth-based pet portrait specialist Megan Elizabeth might not need any more publicity. Her work was endorsed over the festive period by none other than northern royalty Amanda Owen, otherwise known as The Yorkshire Shepherdess of Our Yorkshire Farm fame. And that is about as high as praise can get!

If you live in the White Rose County and you are looking for an expert on animals to pass judgement on the artwork you create, then Megan clearly went straight to the top and received the backing that she wanted and thoroughly deserves.

Because drawing animals is a passion that dates back to Megan's childhood. Although it wasn't all plain sailing to arrive at her current career.

"I used to draw all the time as a kid. I don't know if you remember the little blue tool caddies that you used to get from the Pound Shop," she says, "I had one of them full of crayons and it used to go everywhere with me. It was like an ongoing joke






that I never went anywhere without it. And then I continued with it [art] through school and college."

However, she found herself stifled as an artist at college and gave up for a time. "You had to do things a certain way and fit certain briefs. You couldn't just do what you wanted. I remember being told that drawing pretty pictures of animals isn't real art. Bear in mind that I grew up near Matlock in Derbyshire, where Pollyanna Pickering is from."

Pickering, by the way, was one of Europe's foremost wildlife artists and held the honour of being the most published artist in the UK. Surely no tutor would dare suggest that she was 'not a proper artist.'

However, the words stung Megan and she left the art behind for a number of years other than occasionally picking up her implements to create gifts for friends. It wasn't until 2019, when someone she knew started making art tutorials on Facebook that Megan was tempted to throw herself back into it.





"I'd got some Hobbycraft vouchers for my birthday," she recalls, "so I tootled off to Hobbycraft and bought a set of 24 polychromos pencils which are the ones I use and which I thought were ludicrously expensive at the time. Before I realised how expensive art pencils are!"

She soaked up online tutorials and found herself back in the artistic routine. Friends and family approached her to produce artistic representations of their pets "then their friends would see it and ask 'do you want to do one for me' and, before I knew it, it turned into a little business."

This coincided with the beginning of the Covid-19 pandemic in early 2020, when Megan's main income had been coming from her employment as a horse riding instructor. With the costs of maintaining the horses remaining the same, but without being able to run lessons, the business at which she worked had to make cutbacks and let her go.

At a loss for what to do next and facing the grim prospect of job hunting just as everything else was shutting down, Megan's fiance Scott told her "you said you wanted to do something with your art. Well, now here's your chance." Spurred on by his support, Megan did just that. "And I haven't looked back since!" she laughs, "I love it!"

Megan really has found her vocation and you can hear the joy in her voice as she discusses her work. "I'm so lucky that I get to spend seven or eight)

hours a day, seven days a week, sitting here doing something I really enjoy," she says.

Pet portraits remain her passion, as they were when she started out as a child with that tool caddy full of crayons. And she loves creating artwork that honours people's beloved animals forever.

"About half of the portraits that I do are pets that have passed away," she says. "It's really lovely speaking to the owners and getting a feel for the pet, learning about their personality and trying to capture that."

"I do wildlife as well, I do a few jobs for charity that tend to be wildlife, but the vast majority of what I do is commissioned pet portraits."

When she takes on these portraits, there is a certain amount of pressure on the artist. Not only to achieve a likeness in a visual sense, but also to capture their personality too. "It can feel high pressure and I often will spend so many hours on a piece and think 'this isn't working' and I'll have to restart it," Megan admits. "It is so important to get the personality as well. I ask for lots of photos of the pets, I'll ask people to tell me about them and their quirky habits, I often go and meet them as well."

However, not all of these visits are successful. "I went to visit one dog who loved jammy dodgers," recalls Megan, "so I took some jammy dodgers, but they were the wrong brand so she wouldn't eat them!"

But there were no such issues when it came to the portrait she painted for Amanda Owen. "I'm a big fan of Our Yorkshire Farm," says Megan, "and a couple of years ago, I saw that Bill, who was her 15-year-old sheepdog, had passed away. I thought it was really sad, there's a different bond with a working dog as a colleague as well as a friend.

I did a portrait over a couple of evenings and sent it off to her and she got in touch and was really



thankful about it. And then just before Christmas I saw that Kate, who was Amanda's own dog had also passed. Again, it's heartbreaking and you could tell that she really meant a lot to Amanda.

I thought I'd do another little portrait and sent it over to her. She messaged me privately on Twitter to say thank you and then posted it online with a really nice message."

That public message, from the Yorkshire Shepherdess herself, read "Not only have I got great memories of Kate but now have a portrait of her by the super talented @MeganArtUK. She's captured every detail about her perfectly. This is exactly the way she cocked her lugs & looked forward when she saw sheep. Thank you #talented."

The plan for Megan now is to run tutorials and build up her gallery portfolio until she has enough material to open a gallery in Holmfirth. She has already been exhibited in London on two occasions, which she regards as a real honour. Her work has been shown twice at the Sketch for Survival exhibition, which raises funds for conservation by the charity Explorers against Extinction.

FOOD & DRINK HOT CROSS BUNS EASTER DELIGHTS





Serves 11 Preparation time 1-2 hours to rise Cooking time 20 mins

INGREDIENTS

225ml milk 500g strong white flour 65g caster sugar 7g fast action yeast 1/2 tsp salt 1 tsp cinnamon 1/2 tsp ginger 1/2 tsp nutmeg zest of 1 orange 50g butter (cold) 200g sultanas

TOPPING

2 medium eggs

50g flour 50ml water marmalade (to glaze)

METHOD

- 1 Warm your milk in a pan until warm.
- 2 In a bowl, combine the flour, caster sugar, cinnamon, ginger, nutmeg, yeast, caster salt and orange zest.
- **3** Add the butter and use your fingers to combine the mixture.
- 4 Next add the milk, eggs and sultanas and mix it together well.
- **5** Transfer the dough out onto a lightly floured surface.
- 6 Knead for 5-10 minutes until the mixture is smooth, elastic and springy to touch.
- 7 Transfer to a clean bowl which is lightly oiled, cover the bowl with clingfilm and leave to rise until it has doubled in size (1-2 hours)

- 8 Once risen, remove from the bowl and knead lightly on a floured surface to knock the air out.
- **9** Split the dough evenly into 11 balls (approx 100g per ball.)
- 10 Lightly grease a cast iron sauté pan and gently place the balls in leaving a small gap between each.
- 11 Cover with lightly oiled cling film, and leave to rise (45-60 minutes) while your oven pre heats at 180°C.
- 12 Meanwhile whisk the flour and water together, and carefully pipe the crosses on top of the buns.
- 13 Bake in the oven for 20 minutes.
- 14 Take out of the oven and brush lightly with marmalade and leave to cool fully - enjoy!

Preparation time $15 \ mins$ Cooking time $45 \ mins$ Serves

INGREDIENTS

6 hot cross buns

120g butter, softened

1 large pear, cored, peeled and thinly sliced lengthways

1 jar Opies black cherries with kirsch

1 jar Opies stem ginger in syrup

6 eggs

200ml milk

300ml double cream

75g caster sugar

110g brown sugar

METHOD

- **1** Preheat oven to 180°C / 160°C fan / gas 4. Grease a round 25cm ovenproof baking dish. Stand each hot cross bun on its side and using a sharp knife slice into 1cm thick slices before spreading one side of each slice with 50g of the butter. Arrange some of the slices around the edge of the baking dish so that they overlap slightly.
- 2 Next add a layer of pear slices around the buns, overlapping slightly. Continue layering the bun slices and pear around the dish until vou finish in the centre. Drain the cherries and scatter half the jar evenly over the buns, using your fingers to push them in between the layers.
- **3** Beat the eggs, milk, cream and caster sugar in a large bowl then pour evenly over the bun

- slices and leave to absorb for 15 minutes.
- **4** Place the dish in a large roasting pan. Pour enough boiling water into the pan to come halfway up the side of the dish. Bake in the oven for 40-45 minutes or until egg mixture is just set. Set aside for 5 minutes to cool.
- **5** Meanwhile, empty half a jar of stem ginger and its syrup into a blender and blitz until smooth. Pour into a pan over a high heat and bring to the boil until thickened before adding the remaining butter and stirring until melted. Pour syrup over the bun slices then leave for a further 5-10 minutes before serving.

TIP Use a mandolin to achieve enviably thin slices of pear for your rosette layering. >

Serves 4 Preparation time $20\ mins$ Cooking time $1\ hour$

INGREDIENTS

- 4 hot cross buns
- 2 large eggs
- 200ml full fat milk
- 25g caster sugar
- 25g butter (add a little extra for greasing the dish)

100ml double cream

1 tsp grated nutmeg

6-8 hollow mini chocolate eggs (this allows the chocolate to ooze into the dish)

1 tbsp caster or icing sugar for dusting

1 tsp vanilla essence


METHOD

- 1 Preheat oven to 180°/160° fan.
- **2** Slice the buns, lightly butter and sandwich back together.
- **3** Slice each bun into 3 pieces, keeping them uniform (formed back with crosses on top).
- **4** Grease a baking dish (9 inches x 6 inches approx) and carefully place the buns in neatly. Be sure to leave a small space between each bun.
- **5** Place a chocolate egg into every other slice inside the bun and sandwich back together.
- **6** Using the Dualit Hand Mixer, make the custard by mixing together the eggs, sugar and vanilla essence. Whisk until pale. Then add the milk and cream, continuing to whisk for a minute to combine.
- **7** Pour half the custard over and between the buns, allowing the liquid to settle for a minute or two before adding the rest over the top. This allows the custard to soak into the buns.
- **8** Combine the nutmeg and sugar and sprinkle over the top.

- **9** Place in the oven on the middle shelf and bake for 50-60 minutes.
- **10** The pudding will rise and puff out whilst baking, check halfway to ensure the top is not burning. If you find it's a little too brown at this stage, loosely place a piece of foil over the top until the last 10 minutes, then remove and continue baking.
- 11 Place a skewer into the pudding to check the custard has set; the inside should be soft and will wobble, if it is runny or loose it needs to cook for slightly longer.
- **12** The pudding will deflate when you remove it from the oven. Allow to cool a little before serving as the middle can be very bot
- **13** Dust with a little caster or icing sugar before serving.

Top Tips:

Cut into squares or slices and serve with a dollop of cream, vanilla ice cream or custard. We have used hollow eggs, but cream eggs also work well. Mint chocolate or chocolate spread is especially nice too.



YORKSHIRE'S 'NESSIE' -

Slippery Sam

uring the 1930s Britain's north coast was regularly visited by a mysterious sea monster. At least, this is what many witnesses attested at the time, including a former lord mayor and two well-known Labour politicians. The press loved this recurring silly season story and the creature was dubbed The Humber Monster and the Withernsea Visitor by various newspapers, though the folk of the Yorkshire coast also called him Slippery Sam, perhaps because of the large variations in eyewitness descriptions of the beast.[i]

Humps

In early January 1934 reports emerged of something strange off the coast of Filey, North Yorkshire – a sea monster. One witness described what he saw from Filey Brigg: 'a huge body with numerous humps and a small head'. A search was made of the bay, though nothing was found.

However, further north in Gristhorpe Bay, the monster was seen again 200 yards from the shore. It must have caused a lot of excitement as a line of humps appeared in to be a false alarm – the row of humps suddenly separated and turned out to be some porpoises swimming in a line.[ii]

Head Like a Horse

The reports by fishermen of a strange creature off the coast of Yorkshire near Redcar and the Humber mouth continued into February, 1934, according to press reports. The Leeds Mercury, for example, claimed that the Yorkshire Monster resembled that of Loch Ness for fearsomeness. It had 'a head like a horse, with big eyes and a broad snout'.[iii]

Two witnesses were fishermen Jack Thompson and his brother Jim, who were out in a little rowing >



boat about a mile east of Redcar. Checking their nets as day broke, they were stunned to see a huge creature in the sea. This is how Jim described the monster:

'It had a head like a horse or hippopotamus, big eyes and a broad snout. We watched it for about a quarter of an hour. It approached the boat but when it got near it plunged under the water and we saw it no more'.[iv] In all their fifty years of fishing they had never seen anything like this creature.

Further down the coast, a fisherman in a boat near Cleethorpes was examining the fishing lines when he shocked his shipmates by shouting in fear and falling back into them. He could only point in speechless horror to what he had seen in the water. His mates rushed to the side to see the water swirling and a huge black shape that vanished into the depths.[v]

The monster seems to have taken a break in 1935, but would back with a splash the following year...

The Mayor Meets the Monster

In early August 1936 the monster was seen by three prominent political bigwigs. Herbert Witard, former lord mayor of Norwich, was with Charles Ammon (Labour Member of Parliament for Camberwell North) and his wife and children and Archibald Gosling, a former Labour MP at Eccles on the Norfolk coast. This is how Witard described what he saw in the sea on that day:

'The creature looks like a huge snake. It was at least a mile out to sea and swimming parallel with the coast. Its speed was terrific. From 90 to 100 miles per hour would not be an exaggerated estimate. It disappeared very quickly on the skyline in the direction of Happisburgh.'[vi]

Charles Ammon, MP, added that the creature

was 'about 40 feet long and different parts of the body rose in and out of the water with the movement of an eel'.[vii]

Witard dismissed the idea that they were mistaken and had misinterpreted a line of porpoises: 'The suggestion that we mistook a shoal of porpoise for a serpent is ridiculous. I am an old sailor and I know something about the habits of porpoise.'[viii]


Slippery Sam

Sightings of a monster off the Yorkshire coast continued in the first few weeks of August, 1936. Mr J. Barkley, owner of the Cliff Café at Sewerby was an official coast watcher for the Board of Trade. He told the Leeds Mercury that he had watched the creature through a telescope from the top of Sewerby cliffs for twenty minutes: 'After lying on top of the water it would rush and dive as though feeding on something below.' He described it as being between fourteen and twenty feet long and looking like a huge black fish.

As sightings continued, thousands of visitors flocked to the coastal towns of Yorkshire in the hope of catching a glimpse of the monster, and many did.

Among the thousands of monster hunters scouring the Yorkshire coast, the creature had been the name Slippery Sam.[ix] This name reflects the fact that the witness descriptions of him are very varied – like a huge fish, like a serpent, like a horse, like a hippopotamus....

And the fact that descriptions were so varied leads to the obvious question: were people witnessing the same thing?

Cleethorpes Catches the Monster!

A number of explanations were offered in the press for the monster sightings. Some suggested porpoises swimming in a line would give the impression of humps near the surface.[x] Although former Lord Mayor Witard dismissed this explanation, looking at his sketch, it could plausibly be seen as the backs of a line of porpoises. Others suggested it might be a shark.[xi] Another explanation offered was that witnesses had actually seen a flock of birds flying close to the surface of the sea, looking at a distance like a long undulating creature. Seals were another explanation, though these would be rather too slow to explain most sightings of our speedy monster.[xii] However, the claims that the creature could swim at a hundred miles per hour must surely be an exaggeration!

The differing descriptions and different locations suggest that witnesses had seen or misinterpreted a number of different creatures for the monster, but perhaps the most likely explanation for a majority of the sightings was a whale.

In mid-August 1936 a party of campers saw what they thought was an upturned canoe on the beach near Cleethorpes. On closer investigation, it

turned out to be a stranded whale. The Hull Daily Mail crowed that 'Loch Ness and other resorts may claim to see monsters, but Cleethorpes catches them!'[xiii]

In any case, the nature of human perception means that if we look hard enough, we will see monsters, whether they are there are not.

World From Rough Stones

AUTHOR AND SELF-CONFESSED MASONRY MAGPIE
ALAN MCEWEN EXPLORES THE WORLD OF SALVAGE
AND THE FACINATING CHARACTERS IT ATTRACTS



lan McEwen built his home - World from Rough Stones House - nestled among the encircling Pennines, from reclaimed York stone, Welsh slate and flagstones sourced from a Blackburn cotton mill.

For years, he had been hauling heaps of random stone, flags and timber from demolition sites ranging from all over Yorkshire and Lancashire. The construction of the Cowling home took six years, as he painstakingly incorporated details to make the house feel historical and exude character.

Alan never cared much for the modern world and, not content with just a house built from scavenged goods, he decided to set up a salvage company to find and sell unique treasures from demolition sites across the UK. Together with his late wife Christine, he founded the salvaging company Dandelion in early 2008. Dandelion sells Alan's collection of stone troughs and antique stone curiosities.

It was through hunting down these old curiosities that Alan came across the scavengers of the North, from the master salvager of Kittlingbourne Brow to master stone carver of the Dales. Northern Life follows Alan as he sets out to explore the salvagers that make their homes, lives and hobbies from the things many of us may chuck away.





Eddie Whiteside

First, we meet with Lancashire's master salvager, Eddie Whiteside. Like Alan, Eddie has built his own house from the things he has salvaged, from Welsh slate to a wrought iron fence. Alan has known Eddie for over 30 years and describes him as having "three large golden earrings dangling from an extended earlobe, with a purple-hued greying beard bobbing up and down."

A journey up to Kittlingbourne Brow, you can't help but be amazed by the spectacle of the recycled church steeple rising up from the house's roof.

Eddie's unique collection doesn't just end at his house, spanning his two-acre site, his eclectic mix of other people's junk is crammed into sheds, old lorries and caravans.

"Eddie is extremely passionate in regard to saving and renovating all sorts of artefacts once manufactured by British craftsmen in a bygone world," Alan writes.

For central heating, Eddie has a six-foot tall cylindrical air-compressor receiver of ancient origin, mounted on an iron box with acts as an ash-pit. Presumably he's attempting to reduce his gas bill!

It's not just salvaged items that Eddie boasts, also on his land is a large fishpond that he hand dug out of heavy clays.

Eddie has made a career out of engineering from working as part of the maintenance team for Blackpool Tower, he soon got used to climbing the 518 feet, Victorian-built tower which does explain the 40 foot tower on his own roof.

Steve 'Stego' Parker

Next up is Steve 'Stego' Parker known for his creative metal salvage. His workshop is tucked away in the hamlet of Mickley, around fives miles from Ripon.

Steve emerged from studying

design at York and Newcastle Colleges eager to create aweinspiring structures but unfortunately didn't have a workshop or tools.

It was a dose of good fortune when Stego met local farmer Graham Clarke who was amassing a huge collection of old plough components which he had hopes of turning into a large mythical flying creature, (probably with the hope of scaring off any wandering Lancastrians from his Yorkshire farm!)

Stego was commissioned to create the unique scarecrow, subsequently called 'The Beast of the North.'

People flocked to see the unique creation and soon Stego was commissioned to create another, a two-metre-long bottlenose dolphin. From these commissions, he went on to create dozens of other creatures, using scraps from agricultural yards.

"I enjoy salvaging materials with a previous life – I love the idea of building something so that people can recognise component parts. It is great when I see admirers of my scrap metal creations, upon studying the work, suddenly grin as the penny drops, upon recognising the bits and pieces such as a bit off a plough or a combine," Stego tells Alan.





Chris Swales

Next, we're off up to the Dales to find out more about Chris Swales of Swales in the Dales. If you're an avid reader of Craven & Valley Life you may already be familiar with Chris as the stonemason who engraved the Captain Tom memorial in Keighley. Captain Tom's famous saying - 'tomorrow will be a good day' was memorialised by Chris in the engraving that now sits in the Captain Tom Memorial Woodland.

A highly acclaimed stone mason and carver, Chris is also tremendously interested in salvaging antique stone.

"Ever since being a young boy, I had enjoyed walking around Skipton and viewing the wonderful stone buildings. This is where my passion for Yorkshire stone came from," Chris explains.

Alan worked with Chris on a project for a traditional designed millstone. This is now on display at an ancient windmill for the public to admire.





Will Mowbray

Finally, we're off down to Shaw, in Oldham. Will Mowbray may not fit the traditional image of a scavenger, clean cut and business-like, Will was the kid at school with his parka filled with sweets, coke cans and anything else that would sell to his friends, from Pokémon cards to BB guns.

Throughout his teenage years, Will spent lots of time with his father, David, who was a stonemason, leading to an interest in the cotton mills dotted across Shaw.

Ever the businessman, he started attending farm auctions and selling his finds; reclaimed stone and other architectural salvage on eBay and Facebook market place whilst still assisting his dad with stonemasonry. In his early twenties Will founded his company WillMow Reclamation & Salvage Ltd in 2017 and it has quickly become one of the leading

salvage companies in the North West. Not bad for a lad still in his twenties!



ith shoppers unable to purchase their favourite produce, some may be considering how they can grow their own at home.

Follow my top tips below for how to grow your own delicious and healthy tomatoes at home...

Choose the right tomato variety

Before you can begin to prep for growing tomatoes, you first must establish which tomato variety you want to grow.

'Gardener's Delight' for example is one of the most popular varieties to grow thanks to its reliable properties and sweet, bite-sized cherry tomato fruits.

Prepare the soil

Tomatoes favour well-draining soil. So, work in rich in organic matter compost, aged manure, or other organic material into the soil toimprove it's fertility and drainage.

Start from seed

The cheapest and most efficient way to grow tomatoes is growing from seed. Right now – from late February to early April – is the prime time to begin sowing tomato seeds.

Tomato seeds need warmth to germinate and take on average between seven to 14 days to germinate. So, either leave them on a warm windowsill indoors or make the most of a greenhouse.

Once germinated, the tomato seedlings can be transplanted into pots. Harvest times will depend on the variety of tomato plants and their level of care.

Provide support

As your tomato plant grows, its fruits naturally become heavier. While this is a sign of a healthy

harvest, the increased load can weigh down stems and put tomato fruits dangerously close to the ground, attracting pests such as slugs and increasing the chance of picking up soil-borne diseases.

Stakes, cages, and trellises can all be used to keep the plant upright and support the fruit.

Water regularly

Tomatoes require consistent watering – about an inch of water per week – and will need even more if they're being grown in a pot.

However, be wary of over-watering your tomatoes. Too much water can lead to root rot while irregular watering and fluctuating moisture levels can damage the tomato fruit, affecting the taste.

Fertilise appropriately

Fertilising can be a great way to boost plant growth and ensure a high yield come harvest.

Use a fertiliser specifically formulated for tomatoes and feed once a fortnight once the first flowers begin to show, increasing water and feed as the tomato fruit increase in size.



operation, Sophia shares the story of her

surgery...

hat a success – I am now the proud owner of two new life saving boobs. I wish I could tell pre-surgery Sophia that everything would be completely fine, the sleepless nights and fretting before the operation started to take its toll. Ten weeks on, I can tell you that it was more than okay. I might have lost my old breasts (and my sanity for a little while!) but I gained a new refreshed positive outlook on life.

The morning of the surgery, I was still trying to pretend it wasn't happening. As I put on my surgery gown, and not so attractive surgery socks, I remember catching a glimpse of myself in the mirror, pale as a ghost and sick with nerves, and realising this is the last time I would see my old boobs! The remarkable breast surgeons Liz Baker and Claire Murphy marked up my breasts with dozens of lines, they were extremely reassuring before the surgery and I could not have asked for a better team or hospital to have experienced this with


As I walked into the surgery room the anaesthetist was waiting for me, the room was extremely big with an operating table in the centre of it. I climbed onto the operating table still wearing my crocs, the team started laughing and pulled my shoes off, it was time for my anaesthetic. Expecting them to make me countdown from 10, I had been yapping on about my upcoming travels to Australia before coming down to theatre, the anaesthetist just said in a soothing voice, 'pretend you're at an Australian beach! You can hear the waves, it's so calm right now' and within ten seconds, lights out!

Are they okay? Do I have boobs? Is this real?

I got wheeled into a new ward when I had come round properly, the morphine and fentanyl made me dizzy and I just remember being awakened by a woman talking loudly on the ward about how excited she was to buy a Christmas jumper this year. This was September?!

I was in a confused state of mind, and I was desperate to have a look at the outcome of the surgery, but I couldn't even lift my arms up, or string a proper sentence together, never mind stand up. I had two chest drains on each side of me to drain off the excess fluid my body was creating as a result of the operation, and I was wearing two snazzy shoulder bags to carry them around in. These were sent to me by a new friend - Dawn, who I had met in a group for people who shared the same BRCA gene through Facebook, she had also had a double mastectomy with reconstruction the previous year and helped me tremendously through my own journey with her support.

My mum, Clare, picked me up the following day from the hospital, I had a pillow strapped to my

chest the whole way home so I couldn't feel the seatbelt pressing against me. Each small bump on the road sent a shock through my chest, ouch!

Once home, I just remember sleeping for days. Neil, my dad, and Clare, did everything for me, from gory things like helping to drain the blood from my chest, to plaiting my hair or making me scrambled eggs. Often you realise in situations like this how much you actually are cared for!

My drains were removed five days following my operation. Freedom!

I took a trip back to Airedale Hospital, six weeks later, to check the progress of my boobs. During my visit there, one of the nurses brought in a white box. Inside was filled with stick on nipples, all different sizes and colours! She gave me some that were similar to my previous ones, which gave me a great sense of normality when I looked in the mirror to see some semi-normal looking boobs again (even if I could peel the nipples back off), it can be my party trick!

Weeks later, the dressings were off. There they were: my new boobs. I looked, and was instantly filled with thankfulness towards these incredible people that have helped me to get here. They had taken away dread and nervousness, replacing it with security and reassurance. I might not have my nipples, and I might have scars, but they will always be a part of me, and a story I can live to tell for a long time!

and everyday life. Try to encourage your children to listen to these sounds too.

Observing nature open up around us and immersing ourselves in the delights of spring can help with stress reduction. When we step out of the story in our head and into the present moment, whether through meditation or mindful activities, we cultivate our capacity to put a pause on stressful thoughts. Stopping and pausing to notice how you feel on a daily walk, for example, can improve your feeling of connectivity with yourself and help you better manage any stress you may be carrying.

Each day we take about 20,000 breaths. This automatic bodily response keeps us alive and helps to regulate our emotions. When we bring attention to our breathing, we take control of our emotions and reactions through mindful purpose.

While being more present we can pause to find joy in the small things, especially during a season as lovely and inspiring as spring. Appreciating less is a good virtue to pass onto children, who are so often bombarded through the media and their peers about needing more stuff to be happy.

If there are any silver linings during this time, it's that we are forced to slow down, be still, and observe.

Together with your child, you can try this mindfulness meditation that aligns perfectly with spring, a time to notice how our earth revives itself and perhaps in doing so, we revive our spirits a little.

Children have a natural mindfulness, particularly when it comes to nature. Now that Spring has begun to peak out from behind the greyness of Winter, the

cloud meditation taps into this natural curiosity.

My spring wish for you is the hope that you will take every opportunity to (mostly) step away from technology and get outdoors, especially as the temperatures warm up.

Begin by having them take five deep mindful breaths. Ask them to stare at the clouds while you ask them these questions to guide the meditation.


- Are the clouds fluffy or thin?



... or else the pleasures of domestic life

kniffiti knitted or sometimes crocheted items that are left in public places as decoration

hural wallpaper on one wall of a room that features one large photo or picture



... and the simple attraction of reading:

romantasy a type of book that is part romance and part fantasy

cosy crime a type of crime fiction that is light-hearted and often humorous, set in a small community without featuring explicit violence

stealth help a type of book that uses a story, or an account of someone's experience, to inspire its readers to achieve goals and overcome problems

... and all sorts of general indulgence:

wearapy the activity of wearing particular clothes as a form of therapy, with the clothes chosen to make the wearer feel happy or comforted

spiritual bath a ritual that involves having a bath to encourage wellbeing, with oils, herbs, flowers, etc. added to the water and in a relaxing environment, for example with candles and soft music

And, of course, every year texting brings with it novel abbreviations:

HOGO an abbreviation for "hassle of going out": a feeling that leaving the house in order to socialise is too difficult or not worth the trouble

FONO an abbreviation for "fear of normal": a worried feeling about going back to your normal life and activities after the restrictions of the Covid-19 pandemic

FORO an abbreviation for "fear of running out": a worried feeling that you may run out of a product or a supply of something.

Value Our Love

Craven&Valley*Life* chats to local lass Katie who unexpectedly became a kinship carer to her niece.

ack in April 2020, the UK had been thrown into lockdown, couple Katie and Mark from Bradford were starting to get used to their new normal. With more time together they had begun to think about starting a family of their own, they had started to save up for the possibility – then a phone call one evening changed their lives forever.

"We had to go and pick up my niece immediately," Katie explains. Katie's sister was no

longer able to take care of the then eight-month-old child. "I knew social services were involved, but I had no idea of the extent. It was a complete shock when they asked us to take her straight away."

Having been in foster care herself, Katie was determined to not let her niece go through the same things she did. Katie wanted the child to know her family and be aware of her identity as she grew up.

However, becoming a carer to her niece was a

big adjustment for the family. "We were an auntie and an uncle. We had sleepovers and spent time with her but then we would give her back. Not being able to sleep for one night every once in a while is fine, but this was completely different, it changes everything about your whole life. There isn't a handbook firstly on how to look after a child in general and then one that's been through childhood trauma."

By agreeing to care for her niece, Katie became a kinship carer, joining over 162,000 kinship carers in the UK. Kinship care is when a relative or friend steps in to provide full time care for a child when a parent isn't able to care for them. Over half of kinship carers are grandparents, but siblings, family friends and uncles and aunts like Katie are also carers.

While Katie finds caring for her niece incredibly rewarding, it has also led to her own plans being put on hold. When the eight-monthold first came to Katie and Mark, they were classed as temporary foster carers, which meant they received financial support from their local authority. In November 2020, however the financial support was reduced following Katie and her partner becoming Special Guardians, the couple could claim child benefit but this was deducted from the weekly allowance. The intention was that the allowance would cover monthly nursery costs, however, the couple had to top this up on average £100 per month just in order for them

to continue working.

In November 2022 the allowance stopped altogether and the couple now have to find over £350 a month for nursery fees. Without this financial support, Katie had to put her own plans on hold. It wasn't just the financial support Katie lost as a special guardian. She was also expected to handle arrangements for her niece to see her mum which impacted greatly on her relationship with her sister. "But my niece has had to take priority. I have to put her first," Katie explains.

As Katie's niece grew older, she also started struggling with behavioural issues, and Katie was struggling to get her the support she needed. That's when she came across charity Kinship. "I got support from my project worker Kelly, she

was the one who got the therapy sorted for my niece, she pushed for it and got us speaking to the right people to make it happen." The charity supports Kinship carers like Katie, providing advice and helping them get the help they need. "They asked if anyone would like to speak about their experience and I volunteered, partly because I wanted to give something back to the charity because they've helped us so much but also I wanted make a difference. If I can help change the law or policy for another kinship carer in the future so that they don't have to go through what we've had to go through then job well done.

"It seems as though children in kinship care aren't valued as much as those in foster care. They don't receive the support they deserve."

Research for the charity reveals that 7 in 10 kinship carers had been forced to spend their savings or pension pots with 78% of carers feeling they

did not receive the support they needed from their

local authority in order to meet the needs of their kinship children.

"The government needs to recognise who we are - we're individuals, we've got lives and ambitions of our own. And that kinship children are just as important as any other child."

Kinship is calling on the government to value the love of kinship carers and take urgent action to improve support available for kinship families.




